Exciting news from the University of British Columbia

On May 16, 2007, the UBC Senate approved dissolving the School Rehabilitation Sciences and the creation of the occupational science and occupational therapy department, effective July 1.

Separate departmental status means more independence to the division, where the Head reports directly to the Dean and the departments have budget autonomy. The division has changed its name to the Department of Occupational Science and Occupational Therapy to better reflect the academic mission: to provide leadership in the understanding of human occupation and the development of evidence-based practices that enhance function and well-being.

Inherent in this statement is the division's resolve to provide leadership, not only in the area of occupational therapy but also occupational science.

With this name change, UBC has reaffirmed its intention to "centre its science on occupation" and to develop doctoral level opportunities in occupational science, as it is only through research in occupation that we can improve the occupational therapy techniques implemented by clinicians.

The OT Faculty at McMaster University has responded to the challenges that students face in trying to understand how theory links with practice.


The McMaster Lens is a tool for "thinking" about theory, and

incorporates concepts and ideas from current OT literature including Enabling Occupation (CAOT, 1997) and the Theoretical Basis of Occupational Therapy (McColl et al., 2003).

The Lens is a graphic

depiction of the unique view of occupational therapists in clinical situations, and demonstrates how we use theory in daily practice.

Global citizenship at work: International fieldwork at UBC

In 2007, nine of the 39 graduating OT students at the University of British Columbia participated in an international fieldwork experience. Put in perspective, that is 23 percent of the class!

The experiences ranged from placements in the hospitals in countries such as

Singapore, Nicaragua, and St. Vincent's, BVI to experiences in facilities such as orphanages in Mexico and community-based rehabilitation in Ladak, India.

This surge in interest and passion for work abroad has let the Division of OT at UBC to develop guiding principles and beliefs around contributions of students as global citizens, the learning outcomes that can be achieved abroad and legacies the students can leave in the respective agencies they were working with. In addition, research questions are being developed and addressed with current and future students.
